Enhancing Resilience in Frontline Community Healthcare (EnRich) Project



Overview

The EnRiCH Project is a key initiative under CARE Nigeria's "She Heals the World" framework, designed to strengthen frontline health services and improve the well-being of communities across Katsina state.

2,000 frontline health workers (FLHWs) in Katsina by enhancing their skills and knowledge to deliver quality essential reproductive, maternal, newborn, child, and adolescent health and nutrition (RMNCAH+N) services to one million people in **200,000 households**.

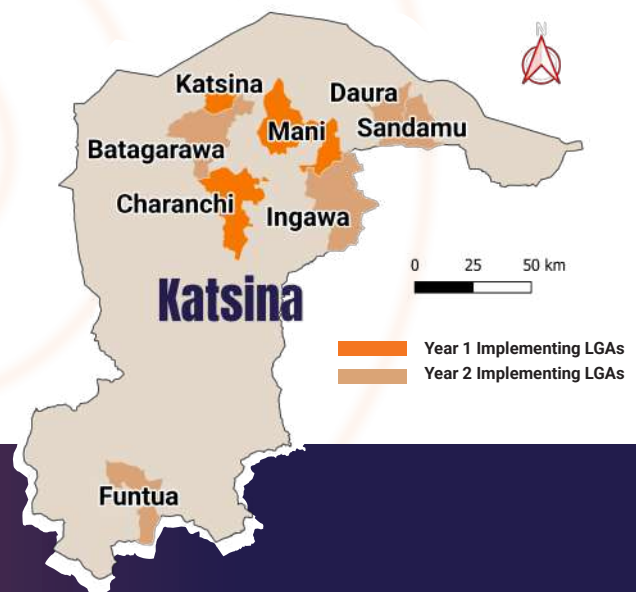

Targets

- **2000** Frontline Health Workers.
- **1,000,000** individuals across **200,000** households benefiting from improved FLHW capacity and services.
- **10** Local Government Areas (LGAs).



Project Objectives



Support professional development, certification, and economic empowerment of 2,000 FLHWs in Katsina.



Use a digital learning platform to deliver continuous, standardized RMNCAH+N training, even in remote, low-bandwidth areas.



Establish Frontline Health Workers Savings and Loans Associations (FSLAs) to promote economic independence for FLHWs.



Strengthen prevention of violence against women and girls (VAWG) and ensure safe, supportive working environments.



Advocate for the formal integration and fair compensation of FLHWs in the state's health system.

Expected Outcomes

Capacity & Quality:

Improved FLHW skills, confidence, and service quality; increased client satisfaction.

Health Impact:

Higher awareness and utilization of RMNCAH+N services; reduced maternal and newborn morbidity and mortality.

3



Safety & Protection:

Enhanced VAWG prevention capacity and safer community health environments.

4



Economic Resilience:

Stronger financial stability and retention of FLHWs through FSLAs.

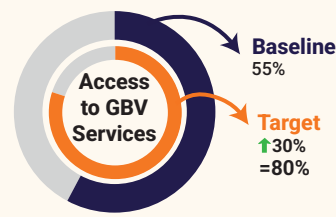
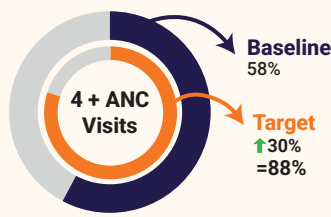
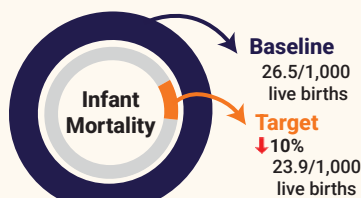
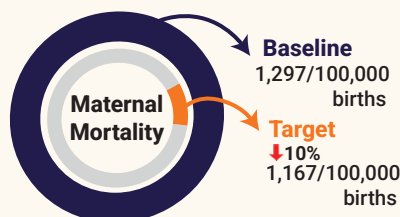
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System Change:

Project Targets vs. Baseline Evaluations



Economic Empowerment of FLHWs

3% of FLHWs in FSLAs report improved income today. EnRICH will raise this to 80%.



Community Knowledge & Awareness

EnRICH will equip 80% of households with lifesaving information, empowering families to act swiftly and safeguard women and girls.



Digital Learning Platform

The project will connect 2,000 FLHWs to a mobile learning app, enabling them to reach 200,000 households

Year 1 Impact at a Glance (2025)



Digital Learning & Professional Development

- 500 FLHWs trained out of 2000 → 25% achieved.
- 97 health facilities supported out of 112 → 87% achieved.
- Digital learning content developed and platform operationalized with all 500 FLHWs enrolled.
- 80% of FLHWs reported increased confidence in handling GBV cases.



Economic Empowerment through FSLA

- 12 FSLA facilitators engaged and trained.
- 25 FSLA groups formed and trained.
- 500 FLHWs participating in savings groups.
- ₦3,680,600 saved cumulatively within 10 weeks.
- Income-generating activities have been initiated, including group-based small businesses such as grain storage and sales, as well as the purchase and resale of eggs, among others.
